FAMILY ASSISTANCE

Payments by the Department for child care of children totaled \$9,458,994.03 for 42,985 children for the month of August . This included payments totaling \$8,226,825.05 for 35,360 children in Licensed Child Care Centers, \$979,638.57 for 5,062 children in Family and Group Day Care Homes, and \$252,530.41 for 2,563 children in Informal Care. The average monthly payment per child was \$220.05.

SOCIAL SERVICES

Children receiving payment from the Foster Care Maintenance Payments program provided through County Departments of Human Resources numbered 1,646 for the month of August. The maximum board payment from the Department is based on the age of the child and is as follows: 0-2 years, \$410.00; 3-5 years, \$423.00; 6-12 years, \$434.00; and 13-18 years (19 if last year in high school), \$446.00. The average board payment per month may be less than the maximum because some of the children included have board payments made partially from private funds and because some children do not remain at board for a full month. In some instances the average board payment may exceed the maximum because certain children are eligible for nursing care or special care.

SOCIAL SERVICES

Children receiving payment from the Aid to Children in Foster Care program provided through County Departments of Human Resources numbered 2,061 for the month of August. The maximum board payment from the Department is based on the age of the child and is as follows: 0-2 years, \$410.00; 3-5 years, \$423.00; 6-12 years, \$434.00; and 13-18 years (19 if last year in high school), \$446.00. The average board payment per month may be less than the maximum because some of the children included have board payments made partially from private funds and because some children do not remain at board for a full month. In some instances the average board payment may exceed the maximum because certain children are eligible for nursing care or special care.

The Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 (PRWORA) required a state work program for families receiving Financial Assistance (formerly AFDC). This Act repealed the Family Support Act of 1988 which had created the Job Opportunities and Basic Skills Training (JOBS) Program. In Alabama, the name JOBS was kept for the new program. The emphasis of the new law is on work activities and employment of recipients. Child care and other supportive services are available to participants.
