FAMILY ASSISTANCE

Payments by the Department for child care of children totaled \$6,114,113.73 for 26,789 children for the month of September. This included payments totaling \$5,467,737.56 for 22,889 children in Licensed Child Care Centers, \$530,233.20 for 2,626 children in Family and Group Day Care Homes, and \$116,142.97 for 1,264 children in Informal Care. The average monthly payment per child was \$228.23.

This Act repealed the Family Support Act of 1988 which had created the Job Opportunities and Basic Skills Training (JOBS) Program. In Alabama, the name JOBS was kept for the new program. The emphasis of the new law is on work activities and employment of recipients. Child care and other supportive services are available to participants.
